POLITICAL PARTIES

What are political parties?

A political party is a group of people with similar interests who work together to achieve similar goals by gaining power in government. The word "party" comes from an Anglo-French word "partir," which means "divide." George Washington warned Americans that our country would suffer if citizens placed the interests of a political party before the interests and needs of the nation.

The Constitution does not mention political parties. However, the Constitution does provide a system of "checks and balances" to keep "factions," or parties, from favoring some groups over the interest of others and the good of the country. These checks and balances are the three branches of government—the executive branch which is led by the President of the United States, the legislative branch which passes laws and the judicial branch, or courts, in which citizens and states settle their differences.

Do we need political parties?

The first political parties appeared in the United States while George Washington was president. Throughout most of its history, the United States has had a two party system.

Political parties play an important role in government and provide opportunities for

citizens to participate in the political process. Political parties usually support different issues or take different stands on the same issues. These differences are important because they offer voters a choice and clarify issues for voters. Parties also provide leadership and monitor, or watch, government policies and programs.

Most political parties are alike in that they

- Recruit and nominate candidates for public offices
- Educate the public about candidates' stands on important issues
- Organize to help their candidates win elections
- Safeguard the public interest by monitoring the actions of officeholders

What are third parties?

Sometimes a smaller party gains enough support to challenge the two major parties. Often, these "third parties" unite behind one candidate or issue. However, these smaller parties rarely win national elections. Third parties are important because they sometimes speak for groups the major parties do not represent and introduce ideas the two major parties may not address.
